

Fundraising 20.00


The balance is for our BC dues and insurance and club operations e.g. bank charges, stationery and postage, coffee supplies.

Fundraising for 2022 - 2023

Once again, I would like to remind members of our ongoing fundraising and thank you for your support in the previous year.

Return-it Express - Only items for which you have paid a deposit can be returned for recycling. Milk products are now included. A complete list is available on the website. Items can be returned to any Return-it in the Tri-cities. Just bag them up in a clear or transparent blue bag. Limit heavier liquor bottles to 7 per bag. Generate a stick-on tag which is available from the machine using my phone number (604-464-0951). Scan the bar code with the gun at the machine and place tagged items in the bin at the back of the facility. We have done very well with this project and hope to keep it going for another year. If you have questions, give me a call or I find the ladies at the Barnet site are very helpful.

Port Moody Liquor Store – If you are purchasing liquor try to support our fundraiser at this store. (2929 St. John's Street in Port Moody). If you mention CFUW to the cashier, they will give us a percentage of you purchase price. If you need more information, Jan J. is handling this fundraiser.

IGA – The proceeds from this fundraiser were a little disappointing but we will keep it going for another year. You are required to preload a card available from Jan J. Use all the funds on the card to purchase your groceries. Keep reloading the card as long as you wish to use it. There are two IGA stores in the Tri-cities – The Westwood Plateau Shopping Centre and at Newport Village. You can use the card at any store in BC, so if you have friends or family that shop at AGA elsewhere, consider asking them to support us.

Meridian Meat — Debby is hoping to do another fundraiser with Meridian later in the fall. Thelma Finlayson (*June 29, 1914 – September 15, 2016*), a 'trail-blazing' SFU entomologist who

was still mentoring students past the age of 95 was a founding member of CFUW Coquitlam.

Her Memorial Service was delayed almost six years because of a plan to dedicate a bench and garden fountain in her honour at the new SFU Biological Sciences building not yet constructed at the time of her passing.

The club members in attendance at the Memorial Service hosted by the SFU Faculty of Science on June 29, 2022, are shown sitting on Thelma's bench in the above photograph.

She started her career as the first female scientist in the Department of Agriculture at Ontario's Belleville Research Institute in 1937. When she joined SFU in 1967, she was the Biological Sciences department's first female faculty member, and upon her retirement in 1979 she was made SFU's first professor emerita.

A founding member of SFU's Centre for Pest Management, Thelma studied larval taxonomy and spe-

cialized in the use of parasites as natural ways of controlling forest and agricultural pests. Her work led to two species of insects being named for her.

She was a quiet spoken, unassuming lady who often shared with her fellow CFUW members not her career accomplishments and honours, but the pure joy she derived from counselling more than 8,000 students in her role as a special adviser to SFU students in her retirement years. Thelma's legacy lives on in honours such as a *Member of the Order of Canada* and the *YWCA's Women of Distinction Year Award*, and dedications such as *the bench* outside the SFU Biological Sciences Building, and the *Thelma Finlayson Stu*







dent Engagement Centre at SFU. However, what stands out the most is her generosity, an endowment of 2.7 million to establish the Finlayson Chair in Biological Control and provide scholarships to students in the Master of Pest Management program, and the lives that she touched in so many ways as a SFU Professor, mentor, adviser, aunt and CFUW member.



Tasoula Saparilla Berggren

Outstanding Award for Contribution to the Republic of Cyprus

In mid-July, the Cyprus Ministry of Diaspora asked CFUW member, Tasoula Saparilla Berggren to return to her birth country, Cyprus to receive the **Outstanding Award for Contribution to the Republic of Cyprus** certificate and medal from President Anastasiades at his palace for life-time contributions in her role as:

- 1. Honorary Consul to Cyprus in British Columbia,
- 2. President of the Cypriot Association in Vancouver, and
- 3. Teaching Professor Emerita, Department of Mathematics, SFU, a founder of large conferences to encourage young women to pursue careers in mathematics.

To quote Tasoula, "I have always enjoyed these roles and never thought I would be awarded a medal from Cyprus, so this was a very nice surprise and honour."

Having received the Award Ceremony invitation on such short notice, her husband Lennart was not able to attend the ceremony because he was committed to giving a talk on sundials at a conference in Nashville, Tennessee. Her son Thorsten saved the day and stepped in for him. At such times one needs a loved one's steady hand to calm the



nerves and share the joy: "Yes, that's my mother!"


